

# Charon Linux Toolkit V1.52 & V1.53 Users Guide



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## Purpose of this document

#### This document is the user's guide of the "Charon Linux Toolkit".

The Toolkit provides the following features:

- Manage start/stop guests at server boot with services and customized shutdown commands:
  - Automatic start of the guests (virtual machines) at Linux server boot
  - Clean shutdown of the guests at Charon server shutdown
  - Clean shutdown of one guest at will using customized shutdown scripts (using 'ssh', 'expect' or any customized tool)
- Monitor the CHARON guests log file
  - Alert on removal of the license dongle
  - Send alerts for all INFO, WARN and ERROR messages found (depending on the error level setting)
- Alert on license approaching termination
  - Number of days before expiration alert is sent can be customized
- Provide menu driven options and command lines to:
  - Start/stop guests
  - Connect to guests console
  - Display license contents, gather license content and update (send C2V and apply V2C files)
  - Send configuration and log files by email
  - Edit configuration files
  - Gather Charon server information: Hardware, Operating System, Storage, Network interfaces, Charon version, Utilities version


This document applies to Linux Toolkit versions 1.52 and 1.53

### Kit download

To download the kit, you must issue a request via email to the Stromasys support team (support@stromasys.com) or ask your reseller

### **Prerequisites**

- Basic knowledge of Unix commands
- Basic knowledge of Charon products
- Charon qualified versions:



Scripts have been tested and validated on the following Linux distributions/versions:



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- Some packages have to be installed on the Charon server:
  - Mandatory packages:
    - glibc.i686
    - bc
    - perl
    - at
  - Recommended packages:
    - telnet: recommended for connection from the Charon server to the virtual machine console
    - expect : recommended if ssh cannot be used to execute shutdown commands from the console
    - evince : recommended for reading online documentation
    - postfix: recommended, Mail Transport Agent used to send emails
    - firefox: recommended for checking and updating licenses, accessing online documentation
- All described operations will have to be performed on the Charon server and logged in as 'root' (no other user supported).
  - The 'menu' must be used by one user at a time only
- Charon-AXP and Charon-VAX installations are supported when installed in /opt/charon folder only
- Mail service must have been configured. Mail transfer agent can be postfix, sendmail, ...
- Within the Charon virtual machines configuration files:
  - do not use spaces or tabs between a parameter and its value as the toolkit does not handle this correctly, i.e.: parameter=value is correct, parameter = value is not correct.
  - do not add devices parameters on the same line, please split the line in 2 lines

### Note related to display/edit options

Some menu options will allow you to display or edit files using available editors (if installed) between:

vim	Text	Advanced users with more features (colored & highlights)

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## Note related to emails

There are 2 kinds of emails:

### Installation

The tools are provided in a tar file that must be extracted into the /opt/charon/utils folder.

If the folder does not exist, by default created at Charon installation, create it and copy the tar file in this directory. In the example below, we assume the tar file was downloaded in the /charon folder:

```
# mkdir -p /opt/charon/utils
# cp /charon/charon_linux_toolkit.V1.52.tar /opt/charon/utils
Or
# cp /charon/charon_linux_toolkit.V1.53.tar /opt/charon/utils
```

Extract the files from the tar file to the Charon installation directory, subdirectory 'utils'

```
# cd /opt/charon/utils
# tar -xf charon_linux_toolkit.V1.52.tar
or
# tar -xf charon_linux_toolkit.V1.53.tar
```

Execute the installation script:


```
# ./menusetup
```

- The setup will check first your terminal settings, if set to VT100 you will not be able to continue until you set the TERM value to VT200, dtterm or xterm (see how to here: Configuration)
- Mandatory and recommended packages installation will be checked.
  - A If some mandatory packages are missing you will not be able to continue.
  - 1 If some recommended packages are missing, installation will continue. Installation of these packages can be done later if needed
- If 'telnet' is installed, you will be prompted to force the mode to character to avoid some input issues while connected to the guests consoles
- The 'menu', 'logtail', 'logview' and 'vmlist' aliases will be created. They will be the commands you'll use to access the menu or to view virtual machines states and log files.
- Preferences can be defined during the setup or later, they are related to the default editors used with text and graphical user interfaces, Out Of Memory (OOM) Killer settings and continuous log view when starting a guest (virtual machine)
- Recurring jobs will be added in the crontab file:
  - if the crontab file does not exist, it will be automatically filled
  - if it already exists, you will be prompted to update it via the selected editor: a check will be performed and the missing entries will be added

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- Alerts parameters will now have to be filled (see Alerts management chapter for more if needed)
  - Select between HTML or pure TEXT emails
  - Mail recipients list (used for alerts, not for sending files like log and configuration files for example)
  - Mail sender (can be used to change the displayed name of the sender)
  - Customize emails footer: if needed, add here your disclaimer, information on the CHARON server or any information you think useful
  - Enable/disable wall alert messages
  - Install or update the alert script. It can be customized later, in this case it is recommended to do this once the virtual machines are installed.
  - Select the alert level from guests log files: 0 = none, 1 = informational+warning+error entries, 2 = warning+error entries (default), 3 = error entries only
  - View alerts if any
  - Enable or disable license expiration alerts from guests logs: 1 alert per hour if enabled, 1 (default) or more alerts per day as defined per the recursive jobs settings
  - The alerts simulator can be used to send all the know alerts via email (for checks)

#### Example:



When the setup is completed either log out and login again to define the command aliases or execute the following command:

# . /etc/profile.d/charon\_menu.sh

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### Upgrade

Except if mentioned in the release notes, an upgrade does not require the Charon virtual machines to be stopped

To upgrade the kit, you will need to:

- read the Charon Linux Toolkit Release notes for Kit 1.52 or Charon Linux Toolkit Release notes for Kit 1.53 document
- copy and extract the files from the tar file to the CHARON installation directory, subdirectory 'utils'

```
# cd /opt/charon/utils
# tar -xf charon_linux_toolkit.V1.52.tar
or
# tar -xf charon_linux_toolkit.V1.53.tar
```

■ To install newly defined aliases (logtail, logview, vmlist, ...), please run the following command:

```
# cd /opt/charon/utils (if not already done)
# ./menusetup -a
```

then either logout or execute the following command for the changes to take effect:

```
# . /etc/profile.d/charon_menu.sh
```

You can then run the 'menu' command as usual

In case of upgrade from a kit older than 41 on a CentOS 7 or Red Hat Enterprise Linux 7.x system, you must first stop all services, including the virtual machines running, and remove the services that were defined using the previous method as described below:

1. List installed services

```
# chkconfig --list | grep charon

charon_gstart 0:off 1:off 2:off 3:on 4:on 5:on 6:off

charon_logchk 0:off 1:off 2:off 3:on 4:on 5:on 6:off
```

2. Remove installed services

```
# chkconfig --del charon_gstart
# chkconfig --del charon_logchk
```

Once these services are removed, you can perform a standard kit upgrade

1 Services will have to be redefined or updated from the 'menu', they will then use the 'systemd' features

### Menu launcher

Execute the following command:

# menu

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### Configuration

If the menu does not correctly display line drawing, you can change some parameters in putty.

#### Putty version 0.71 and above:

Set the new parameter "UTF8linedraw=1"


- on Linux, add a line in .putty/sessions/yoursession containing this parameter (above)
- on Windows, change settings from "Window" 

  "Translation" pane and check the button "Enable VT100 line drawing even in UTF-8 mode"
- 1 you can keep your locale / codepage as UTF-8

#### Putty version 0.70 and below:


Change the terminal settings: if set to vt100 for example, you will see lowercase characters in place of menu borders.

To correct this, enter the following commands:




#### Notes:

- New TERM value can also be set to xterm
- Starting with version 1.48, it is possible to disable line drawing (semi-graphics) from the preferences menu
- If you're using putty, you'll maybe have to force the Terminal-type string:



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and maybe Remote character set parameter:



lf you have issues with some characters that are not displayed correctly, please see this article: Cannot get correct line drawing on Linux/UNIX with Putty

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### Install/Upgrade/Remove Charon

#### Description

This option helps in installing and uninstalling Charon. You have to provide the .tar.gz file (kit) location, the .tar file if it has been unzipped or the folder where the kit was unzipped and extracted, the tool will install all packages. You can also provide a software license kit location if any, .tar or folder, the script will also perform the setup.

Ut is recommended to locate all Charon kits in the same folder as this menu will remind the last folder you used in the previous session (if not, you will be prompted to select the folder)

#### Notes:

- · .tar.gz kit files will be uncompressed automatically
- .tar files will be removed once extracted into their destination folder
- If the kit is provided with a .md5sum file and this file is present in the same folder as the kit, the md5sum check will be automatically performed.
- To display the options available, type "?" and press enter:

```
Enter:

i - to install or upgrade

u - to uninstall (available if a product is at least installed)

r - to reload the screen (refresh)

s - to install/uninstall Software license provided as a kit

clean - to remove all installed CHARON products

q - to quit

? or h - to display this message
```

- 1 To upgrade Charon-AXP or Charon-VAX, you will need to stop the running virtual machines (AXP and VAX), uninstall the current version and install the new one.
  - If you only upgrade the Charon Linux Toolkit, you will not have to stop the running virtual machines except if notified in the Release notes
    document.
- 1 To remove Charon-AXP or Charon-VAX, you must ensure there is no running virtual machine related to the product
- The installation log will be stored in the /opt/Charon/log folder with names yum.install.<date> (name is given at the end of the installation process)

#### Fresh Charon installation example

#### Context:

- Operating system used is Red Hat Enterprise Linux 7.7
- We will install Charon-AXP V4.10 Build 202-03
- License key is based on USB dongle
- We assume Charon kits have been downloaded to the /charon folder

#### Example:

```

For a fresh installation the setup does not know where you use to store the Charon kits so enter the kit location (2) and select the kit you want to install (3) .

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### Charon upgrade installation

To upgrade a Charon product version or to install patches, please refer to the appropriate release notes first.

- All running virtual machines have to be shutdown before upgrade
- Upgrading to a new version requires all previous versions to be uninstalled

### Installation of Charon-AXP and Charon-VAX on the same Linux server

Starting with build 16803, if you install Charon-AXP and Charon-VAX on the same server, they must be the same build

#### Context:

- Operating system used is Red Hat Enterprise Linux 7.7
- We will install Charon-VAX V4.10 Build 202-03 on a server where Charon-AXP V4.10 Build 202-03 is already installed
- We assume the kits have been downloaded to the /charon folder

Execute the "menu" command and select option 1 and ensure the already installed Charon-AXP build matches the Charon-VAX:

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### HASP license details

#### Description

Displays the license content and optionally can be used to send the license content, human readable format, via email.

lt will work even if you are logged in via 'ssh'. See CHARON on Linux - Cannot get license information or run guests over ssh for more information.


i Licenses descriptions (usage, location, etc...) can be added to the display list by manually creating the following file: /opt/charon/utils/charon\_licenses.list

This optional file must contain the license number followed by a description and an ANSI color code (see "# man terminfo" and search for "Color Handling"), each parameter separated by a semicolon. One line per license.

#### Command line parameters

The script can be executed in command line or from the crontab (see: Manage recurring jobs: license expiration check, log events (cron)) using the following command:

Some parameters are available:

- Number of days before the license expires that will generate an alert → specify a number of days (default = 7)
- Prevent from sending default email → -nomail . This option is useful when a custom script is created to send alerts (see further)
- Force the expiration date for debugging → -expdat=<DD-MMM-YYYY> where DD = day of the month, MMM = month (3 characters, 1st letter uppercase), YYYY = year

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### Custom alert script

A customer script can be created to send alerts for example when a monitoring software is installed.

The script has to be created in /opt/charon/utils folder and named charon\_expchk.custom with "execute" permission.

It is invoked for each product and has the following parameters:

- \$1 = level that can be (case sensitive): Informational, Minor, MAJOR, CRITITAL, EXPIRED or NEUTRAL
  - Note: NEUTRAL is sent when no alert is detected, used to send counter alert.
- \$2 = message starting with ":" followed by the license expiration date, the license number and the product.
  - Example: : 13-Jul-2019. License: 1003415. Product: CHARON-AXP

### **Description**

Manages the Charon virtual machines (guests) defined as services, used to create, delete, start and stop virtual machines on user request or upon system request (Linux server boot & shutdown).

The service works with a guests list containing the emulator executable file name, configuration file and, optionally, the auto\_boot on server startup parameter (1) at service level, not the same as SRM console level).

- Startup: the virtual machine is executed in detached mode (using '-d' parameter) and then requires the console to be set as virtual serial line.
  - Connection to the console will be performed using telnet on the defined localhost / port. This can also be performed using other utilities like putty. If there is more than one quest on the server, quests are started in parallel.
  - Before the guest starts, the network interfaces used will be checked and all the offload parameters will be set offline.
- Shutdown: a common shutdown script can be created for guests shutdown. See "Service management Create/Edit guest stop script" for details.
  - If the script does not exist, the virtual machine process is <u>killed</u> without proper guest shutdown. This is the equivalent of a power off on Tru64 or OpenVMS side.
  - If the script exists, it executes the customer defined command lines to perform a proper shutdown (using 'ssh', 'rsh' or 'expect' for example). If the virtual machine process is still running after execution, the stop operation is considered as failed so for Linux systems not using systemd (Red Hat 6) the script must stop the emulator either by sending a "power off" at SRM prompt (AXP) or F6 key (VAX) with 'expect' or just by killing the process. For Linux systems using systemd (Red Hat 7 and CentOS 7), the process is killed by the system.
  - If there is more than one guest on the server, guests are stopped in sequential mode during server shutdown based on their order in the guests list. This order can be modified from the menu. This is valid only for Linux systems not using systemd (Red Hat 6), for other systems, the services description files will have to be modified to add dependencies using Before or After for example. For more information, see manpages: # man systemd.unit

#### Menu description

- The first part of the menu displays server information: server boot time, number of CPUs and Memory Free / Total.
- This description is valid for all menu options displaying the virtual machines list and for the "vmlist" command line.
- The second part displays the list of virtual machines (guests) managed. Column details:

Column	Description
Emulator	Emulator used
Configuration File	Configuration file name (shortened)
CPU	Displays the number of CPUs by looking into configuration file settings (set n_of_cpus) first then using default value for the selected hardware. If no information is available, "-" is displayed instead.
	The number of CPUs displayed does represent the number defined in the configuration file or the default number of cpus for this hardware model. The real number of CPUs the virtual machine owns depends on the CHARON server hardware limitations, CHARON licenses and also licenses on the virtual machine side (Tru64 or OpenVMS)
Memory	Displays the amount of memory defined in the configuration file (if defined). If no information is available, "-" is displayed instead.

  - Description (not available on Red Hat Enterprise Linux 6.x as it is defined in the systemd service)
  - Start/stop date
  - Stop script Displays the status of the stop script used to perform a clean shutdown of the guest. Can be:
    - Not found: the script has not been created. 🚹 If not found, a service stop request will induce a kill of the emulator process
    - To customize: the script exists and a case line has been added for the specified configuration file. It must however be
      customized with some commands to perform a clean shutdown of the guest (OpenVMS or Tru64 virtual machine).
      - For more information and examples, see VM management Create/Edit guest stop script
    - Case not set: the script exists but does not relate to the specified configuration file. This means it has either been created
      manually or initialized automatically by the menu and a new guest has been added after initialization.

    has been discovered: (1)=NIC does not exist, (2)=NIC is not managed by ncu, (3)=NIC is already used, (4)=NIC has an IP address.
- The third part displays the available options that are detailed in the VM Management (add/remove VM, start, stop, console connection, ...)#Menuoptions chapter further.

#### Notes:

- The star besides the "as4100 / pluto" virtual machine means it has been started using the "vmstart pluto" command and next commands lines like vmstop, vmcfg, vmconsole will use this virtual machine if no other one is specified.

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
## Remove guest

<u>1</u> Before removing a guest, please ensure it has been properly stopped (a check will automatically be performed before removal). The way the guest is stopped depends on the "Stop script" existence and settings (see Service management - Create/Edit guest stop script)

if the guest log is monitored, you will be proposed to stop and remove the monitoring service

## Description

Use this option to either edit the log files using a selected text editor or to have a continuous view ("live") of the log file for the selected guest.

#### Notes:

- Rotating log files are supported only with CHARON-AXP and CHARON-VAX V4.7 minimum and Linux Toolkit 42 minimum
- Log files are automatically archived at guest start whatever the log\_method parameter is set in the configuration file so a new one is created each time.
- The logs are kept for 60 days by default. See "Manage recursive jobs: license expiration check, log events (cron)" to change settings.
- When using the log file edition, only 16 most recent ones are displayed in the list. To get older files, you will need to find them in the log file folder with name identical to the defined log file and with extension:
  - ".upto<YYYY-MM-DD-HHMNSE>" (example: /charon/pluto.log.upto2015-07-02-172824 ) if the virtual machine is not using rotating log files or
  - as defined by the log rotation mechanism (example: /charon/logs/pluto-2015-11-30-14-13-55-000000000.log)

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# VM management - Install, update or manage service

## Description

Depending on Linux distribution and version, this option has different names and functions:

# Red Hat Enterprise Linux 6.x

Option name: Install or update service

Allows you to install (after a fresh install) or update guests management service (kit upgrade).

Updating the service does not require the guests to be shutdown & restarted

## Red Hat Enterprise Linux 7.x and CentOS 7

#### Option name: Manage 'systemd' services

Allows you to view the service status and update the service configuration file to add dependencies, description, etc...



Be extremely cautious when updating the file. Preferably limit updates to:

- Description=, After=, Before=, Wants= parameters in the Unit section
- TimeoutStopSec= in the Service section
- Restart=, RestartSec=, StartLimitInterval=, StartLimitBurst= parameters in the Service section as described in the How to restart CHARON-VAX/AXP on Linux automatically on failure chapter.



## Description

Use this option to edit the stop script that will be executed at service shutdown upon manual request or during the Charon Linux server shutdown procedure.

The script is unique and uses the configuration file (full name) to select commands to be executed at guest shutdown (selected by "case in...").

If the script does not exist, it will be generated automatically based on existing guests list and will by default do nothing except preparing the script skeleton with commands using the provided script examples to perform the shutdown via either "expect", "rsh" or "ssh". Newly added virtual machines will have their "case" added to the script when it will be edited.

To be able to perform a clean shutdown of your Tru64 or OpenVMS virtual machine, you will have either to use the provided scripts (see above) or to add your own shutdown scripts.

If you plan to use the "expect" utility, please read Tips and Tricks - Shutdown guests with Expect tool for more.

Basic knowledge of shell programming is needed to implement the clean shutdown / stop script.

Method	Comments
expect	Requires you pass user and password to the script so that it can connect to the OPA0 console via "telnet" and execute the shutdown commands. The "guest_shutdown.exp" script, located in the /opt/charon/utils folder, can perform operations to:
	<ul> <li>log off a user connected on the console if the prompt is detected,</li> <li>enter a username/password to login if "login:" or "username:" is detected,</li> </ul>
	execute the shutdown command if the prompt is detected,
	<ul> <li>detect the SRM prompt (&gt;&gt;&gt;) to issue the "power off" command (AXP) or send the F6 key (AXP &amp; VAX) if enabled.</li> </ul>

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#### Note for Red Hat Enterprise Linux 7.x and CentOS 7.x

If your application and server need time to shutdown, it could be necessary to give more time in the service definition to prevent from the service stop procedure to fail due to timeout.

To do so, open the "Manage 'systemd' services" option and edit the service configuration file. You can then add the TimeoutStopSec=parameter in the Service section.

- Options 1 to 5 are explanations on how to setup and prepare the virtual machine and the Charon Linux server (if necessary) to use the three available methods.
- Option 6 edits the script. This script is in a form of "case in <configuration filename> do ..."
- Option 7 is used to test the script. Use with caution on production machines.

You'll find in options 1 to 5 all the details to setup the remote connection: packages to install, proxy settings for rsh, key pair definition for ssh (password and passphrase free), the necessary firewall settings if needed, etc...

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### Common stop script explanation

When the script is initialized using option 6 or when a new virtual machine is added, the following lines are added:

One of the blue colored lines above has to be uncommented depending on the method chosen. Other lines can remain in the script or can be deleted.

#### Notes:

- The values between the < and > signs have to be filled manually.
- The operating system must be set to either TRU64 or VMS (case insensitive).
- If the "rsh" or "ssh" method is used, the <hostname>, corresponding to the virtual machine hostname, must be known by the Charon Linux server.

#### Stop script content example:

## Provided shutdown scripts explanation

#### Note for Red Hat Enterprise Linux 7.x and CentOS 7.x

Whatever the shutdown script execution result is, the stop request sent by the systematl command will stop the emulator. It is very important then to ensure the stop script has been tested and validated.

#### charon\_gstop\_expect

- Check if there's an active connection to the console on the local host, kill if any.
- Execute the /opt/charon/utils/guest\_shutdown.exp expect script with the values provided: username (root), password, prompt, operating system (either TRU64 or VMS). This script is able to send the shutdown command depending on the returned characters on the console. This can be the SRM prompt ">>>", the "login:" or "username:" prompts or the prompt of the logged in user.
- Report all output to /opt/charon/log/console.stop.<guest name>.log.

#### Notes:

- With Charon-AXP, the "power off" command is sent at the SRM prompt
- With Charon-VAX, the "power off" command does not exist. To power off the virtual machine, the F6 key has to be enabled in the configuration file (set OPA0 stop\_on="F6"). If not set, the emulator process is killed.
- If the console is locked from an external connection or if the prompt is not detected after sending a carriage return, the expect script will fail.

## charon\_gstop\_rsh

- Check the guest can be reached via ping, if yes:
  - Issue the shutdown command via "rsh" (depends on the operating system),
  - Wait for a few seconds
  - Check if the guest can be "pinged" and repeat with an interval of 5 seconds
  - If the guest cannot be pinged, assume the shutdown procedure is complete

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

## Optional guest display status script


It is possible to create a script, "/opt/charon/utils/charon\_gstart.chkrun" (an example is provided in the 'charon\_gstart.chkrun.example 'file) that will add a status line while displaying the guests list for running guests only. This script, if needed, has to be created manually and must be executable.

This status line is the result of the command you executed for that guest (known by its configuration file), for example a ping, an ssh command displaying uptime (Tru64) or boottime (OpenVMS).

## Description

Use this option to connect to the guests consoles, kill active connections if any and to view console log files.

#### Notes

- Itelnet" package must be installed, it will be used to connect from the CHARON server to the virtual machine console
- The session will be recorded in a log file:
  - If 'set OPAO log=' is found in the configuration file (not available with all CHARON products versions), the log will be stored in the temporary folder: '/tmp/console.<configuration file name shortened>.tmp.log' and will be overwritten for each session. It is just kept for information as the console log is managed by the CHARON emulator itself. 1 For Charon-AXP and Charon-VAX version 4.9 and above, the line "set COM1 alias = OPAO port = cport>" (new syntax) is also checked.
  - If there is no 'set OPAO log=' line in the configuration file, the file will be located in '/opt/charon/log/console.<configuration file name shortened>.log'
- If 'stop\_on' and/or 'break\_on' features are enabled in the configuration file, this will be reminded before starting the telnet session
- To leave the telnet session, press the escape character which is by default CTRL + ]. This character can be changed in the /root/.telnetrc file by defining the 'set escape' parameter:





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## Manage monitored guests logs

## Description

A service can be defined in order to monitor the guests log files to look for key removal messages (based on interval defined on the dongle) and/or informational, warning and error messages. It also monitors in parallel dongle removal (immediate mode).

The service works with a list of log files to be monitored.



The log file name must be defined with full path within the configuration file.




A Rotating log files are supported only with Charon-AXP and Charon-VAX V4.7 minimum

🚺 If the Charon log monitoring (global) option is set to enabled (default) in the preferences, the log monitoring service is created automatically when creating a virtual machine from menu option VM Management (add/remove VM, start, stop, console connection, ...).

## Management


This option offers the possibility to edit the log file list, start/stop monitoring for a guest, view the guest log file, view the monitoring log file, install or update log monitoring service for Linux servers without "systemd" feature (Red Hat 6) or to manage "systemd" services for Linux servers with "systemd" (Red Hat 7 and CentOS) and to start/restart the aksusb log monitoring.

#### Notes:

- The list of monitored log files is automatically filled with the log files found in the configuration files for guests defined with the Manage monitored guests logs menu option when selecting the "Update log files list" option 1.
- The install/update service option will just restart the log monitoring service and not the guest.
- The aksusbd log monitoring will look into the "/var/log/messages" log file (Red Hat 6) or will check the journalctl (Red Hat 7 and CentOS) and will send an alert on dongle removal and dongle detected quite immediately
- The guest log monitoring:
  - will send alerts when information, warning and error messages will be detected depending on the alert level defined at Alerts management Select guests log alert level. Note alerts will be send in a bulk email message by default: one alert every 1 minute based on crontab entry settings for '/opt/charon/utils/charon\_logevent' (see Manage recursive jobs: license expiration check, log events (cron))
  - It will also send alerts on guest start and stop
  - Dongle removal and detection alert messages will be sent based on license check interval defined with the license (default is 1 hour).
  - Each time a license is detected in the guest log file, an expiration check will occur and will send alerts if necessary
  - On rare cases, the dongle can be seen as unplugged whereas it is still plugged in leading the virtual machine to stop. The log monitoring
    feature is then able to detect this case and perform the necessary actions. More information is available in our Knowledge base in this
    article: CHARON for Linux Detected removal of the license whereas dongle is connected
- If you remove a guest from the "Service management Update guests list" option, the log monitoring service will be removed from the list
- In case you're using regular (main) and backup license dongles, you will receive a "License dongle found" alert on dongle switch.
  - If the alert tells you the license detected is a "Runtime limited license", you'll have to replace your regular dongle as soon as possible.
- If you have more than one virtual machine running on the same server, do not use the same log file name more than once even if the log folders are different
- If you change the folder of an existing virtual machine, you'll have to update the service manually (Red Hat Enterprise Linux 7+ and CentOS)





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## **Preferences**

## Description

This option allows the users to define the following settings:

- Default editor for Character User Interface and Graphical User Interface with the selection mode, automatic or on demand. Automatic means the GUI will be preferred (if defined) if available otherwise the CUI editor will be used.
- Continuous log view:
  - start or not when the virtual machine is started from the menu.
  - display or not a reminder to tell how to exit from the view (CTRL-C).
- Out Of Memory killer settings. The following settings are used to prevent OOM Killer to kill the processes if the available memory is low.
  - Charon VM process killing prevention → if enabled, when displaying the list of Virtual Machines, a message will be displayed to confirm the running VM is protected against OOM Killer ("Protected/OOM Killer")
  - VM overcommit\_memory value → we recommend settings this value to 2.
  - VM panic\_on\_oom:
    - if set to 0 / disabled (recommended) → the kernel will kill some roque process, by calling oom kill().
    - if set to 1 / enabled → the kernel panics when out-of-memory happens.
- Semi-graphics enabled/disabled
- Display guests separator: can be none, blank line or separation line (useful if more than one virtual machine is configured on the server)
- Charon log monitoring (global):
  - if enabled (default), the Linux Toolkit will create a log monitoring service when adding a new virtual machine and will report warning & error messages plus messages related to license, etc...
  - if disabled, this service will not be created. This is useful if a monitoring software monitors the Charon log files and the license driver processes.

## Scheduled jobs details

#### Expiration check alert (charon\_expchk)

1 The expiration check alert sends alerts by default 15 days before expiration (7 days in interactive mode).

This number of days can be changed using parameter 1 as number of days

#### Example for 21 days, running everyday at 08:00AM and 04:00PM (16:00):

The '-nomail' parameter can be used to make the script check if the license dongle can be read: if not or if a timeout is detected, the aksusbd drivers are restarted. This is mainly used for debugging.

## Monitor abnormal termination of the guests (charon\_mongstop)

This job is active by default, it is recommended not to prevent it from running. It's goal is to send alerts if a guest has been stopped whereas it was not requested.

It is used only with Red Hat Enterprise Linux 6.x.

Red Hat Enterprise Linux 7.x and CentOS 7.x are using systemd feature to monitor service abnormal termination so the corresponding lines will not be added in the crontab.

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## Log events (charon\_logevent)

This job is active by default, it is recommended not to prevent it from running. It's goal is to scan for events in the guests active log files and send alerts based on alert level defined by the administrator. It runs by default every 1 minute so alerts will be sent in bulk mode rather than one alert per error detected. The interval can be updated at your convenience.

## Logs archiving utility

This utility will archive services log files and guests console log files (if not managed by the emulator itself)

Default from the crontab entry is to keep files for 60 days and then zip older log files. Zipped files will be kept for 6 months


## Settings

## Mail mode (TEXT/HTML)

Alerts are by default sent in HTML format. With some mail clients, HTML mails are not correctly displayed or even rejected. This option is used to switch between HTML format and pure TEXT format.

## Mail recipients list

All alerts coming from monitoring scripts and checks scripts are sent using a common alert script that sends emails (via "sendmail") to the recipients list that can be defined using this option.

1 The common alert script can be customized too if you prefer not to receive emails and use commands from your monitoring software for example.

1 Do not add blank lines and set one recipient per line

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#### Mail sender



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## Update/reinstall common alert script


All alerts coming from monitoring scripts and checks scripts are sent using a common alert script.

If this script does not exist, it is initialized by copying an example provided in the kit.

If it exists and is different from the original one, you are invited to reinitialize it from the default one:

- Answer "yes" if you did not change the original script file and you have updated the Linux Toolkit (read the corresponding release notes)
- Do not answer "yes" if you customized your own alert script.
- In case you've overwritten the existing alert script, the previous version can be restored from the "/charon/archive" folder

#### Example:



This script can be customized to send alerts the way you want, adding for example commands to link with your monitoring tool. It is based on an alert code passed as parameter 1.

All other parameters are information related to the alert. The script uses templates in order to send emails and wall messages (see "/opt/charon/utils/templates/\*.wall" files if needed).

The table below lists all available values for parameter 1 in case you plan to customize the scripts and send alerts by your own (monitoring software lines of commands, snmptrap, etc...)



We can see above:

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- 1. A message telling the emulator is started
- 2. A message telling the license (main one) is found and that also displays its expiration date
- 3. The main license dongle has been unplugged and the aksusbd monitor reported the alert (immediate). We can see one license (backup one) is still connected
- 4. Warning messages are sent for the hardware requirements
- 5. The license dongle was plugged in again.
  - (i) We do not see here any dongle removal alert reported by the emulator itself, this is because by default the emulator checks for dongle presence every 1 hour (deferred)

Press CTRL-C to get back to the previous menu

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#### License expiration alerts from guests

This option will toggle on/off the WARNING alerts sent from the guest log file. By default these alerts are sent once per hour 120 hours before expiration whatever the license interval check is set to.

If you have setup the log level alert option to receive WARNING messages then you will receive one alert per hour. This option can be disabled if the expiration check entry is set in the crontab (by default).

A Backup licenses (time limited): please take care of the time remaining that will be reported in the license detection alert, if the number of remaining hours is less than 24, you could not receive any alert from the license expiration check that runs everyday at 09:00 AM by default. It is possible to make it run more than once a day in this case.

## Hardware specs warning message Enabled

Enable or disable hardware specifications warning messages to be sent on Charon boot. Depending on Charon version, wrong messages can be sent. This this option prevents from sending warning alerts in case harwdare specifications warning messages are displayed in the log file.

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#### Immediate alert on dongle removal Enabled

Enable or disable immediate alert on dongle removal. These alerts are monitored by the aksusbd log monitoring which is totally independent from the Charon virtual machine log files monitoring.

Since Charon version V4.9, the license communications are checked more often than they were in previous versions.

This option, if disabled, prevents from sending too many alerts in case of dongle removal and re-connection but be aware that if no Charon virtual machine is running, the removal and re-connection will not generate any alert.

#### Reduce WARN msgs on dongle removal

This option is valid for Charon-AXP and Charon-VAX V4.9 and above.

If enabled, it will prevent from sending too many alerts on dongle removal thus the following messages will not generate an alert:



## 'vi' and 'vim' text editors

#### Notes:

- When typing text, press <ESC> once finished. In case you're blocked, press also <ESC> before executing commands described below
- both editors use case sensitive commands

Request	Command
To quit without saving	Press ':' then enter 'q!'
To quit with saving	Press ':' then enter 'x' or 'wq'
Go to top of file	Press ':' then enter '0'
Go to last line	Press 'G'
Search pattern	Press '/' then enter your search text. Press then 'n' for next (forward) or 'N' for backward
Remove current character	Press 'x'
Insert text	Press 'i' (press ESC once text completed)
Insert line	Press 'o' for a line below cursor, 'O' for a line above cursor (press ESC once text completed)
Delete a line	Press 'dd'

## 'gedit' graphical editor

'gedit' is a graphical text editor, users familiar with Windows notepad should not encounter difficulties to use it.

Request	Command

## 'nano' text editor

'nano' is a basic text editor, very simple to use and displaying available commands at the bottom of the screen. For example, to leave 'nano', use 'X (press CTRL + X)

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## How to setup 'ssh' trusts between Linux and Tru64

#### **Notes**

- The prompts will tell you where to execute the commands, "Tru64#" (root user) or "Linux#" (root user)
- Remember Linux/Unix is case sensitive
- If hosts are not known by each other, fill the /etc/hosts file for example (using vi for example)
- linuxhost represents the name of your CHARON server (can be any name you want)
- tru64host represents the hostname of your Tru64 virtual machine
- Generate the key

```
Linux# cd /root/.ssh
Linux# ssh-keygen -t rsa

Do not specify a passphrase
Linux# ssh-keygen -e -f id_rsa.pub > linuxhost.pub
```

- Copy the linuxhost.pub file, or use copy/paste, in the l.ssh2 folder on the Tru64 host
- Define the authorization file:

```
Tru64# cd /.ssh2
Tru64# echo "Key linuxhost.pub" >> authorization
```

Initialize the first ssh connection (answer 'yes' to confirm)

```
Linux# ssh tru64host date
```

then retry the same command to verify the trust is working.

If an error occurs, you can check and clean the /root/.ssh/known\_host file on the Linux host

If trying to execute a remote command on the Tru64 system, a message telling "no matching cipher found" is displayed, the cipher has to be setup on the Linux server side in the /root/.ssh/config file:

```
# cat /root/.ssh/config

Host tru64host

Hostname tru64host

KexAlgorithms +diffie-hellman-group1-shal

HostKeyAlgorithms +ssh-dss

Ciphers +3des-cbc
```

## How to setup 'ssh' trusts between Linux and VMS

#### **Notes**

- The prompts will tell you where to execute the commands, "VMS\$" (system user) or "Linux#" (root user)
- Remember Linux/Unix is case sensitive, VMS is not
- Linux: if VMS host is not known, add it to /etc/hosts for example
- VMS: if Linux is not known, add it using: \$ UCX SET HOST LINUX /ADDR=xx.xx.xx

Enable SSH on the VMS server:

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```
VMS$ SET DEF SYS$LOGIN
VMS$ @TCPIP$CONFIG
```

- Select then:
  - Option 3 Server components then enable and start service SSH, option 19
  - then Option 2 Enable & Start service on this node

```
* Create a new default server host key? YES: YES
    Creating private key file: TCPIP$SSH_DEVICE:TCPIP$SSH.SSH2]HOSTKEY
    Creating public key file: TCPIP$SSH_DEVICE:TCPIP$SSH.SSH2]HOSTKEY.PUB
```

Generate the key on the Linux server and convert it to be readable by VMS

```
Linux# ssh-keygen -t rsa
\rightarrow Do not specify a passphrase
Linux# ssh-keygen -e -f /root/.ssh/id_rsa.pub > /root/.ssh/linuxserver.pub
```

- Copy the generated file /root/.ssh/linuxserver.pub (or use copy/paste between putty session for example) to the VMS system in the sys \$SYSROOT: [SYSMGR.SSH2] directory
  - If this folder does not exist, create it using the following command: \$ CREATE /DIRECTORY SYS\$SYSROOT:[SYSMGR.SSH2]
- On the VMS system add the Linux server key to the authorized keys:

```
VMS$ SET DEF SYS$SYSLOGIN
VMS$ SET DEF SYS$SYSROOT:[.SSH2]
VMS$ OPEN/WRITE TMP AUTHORIZATION.
If the file already exists, use /APPEND instead of /WRITE
VMS$ WRITE TMP "KEY LINUXSERVER.PUB"
VMS$ CLOSE TMP
```

Do not forget the dot at the end of the authorization file name.

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# How to setup 'rsh' trusts between Linux and Tru64

#### Introduction

RSH executes commands on a remote host. It can be used to issue a shutdown on the Charon Tru64 virtual machine.

#### Pre-requisites

The RSH method requires the 'rsh' package. It can be installed using the following command:

```
# yum install rsh
```

#### **Notes**

On the Tru64 system issuing the shutdown, create a proxy between the root user of the Charon server and the user.

#### Example ('ceres' is the Charon server name):

```
# echo "ceres root" >>~/.rhosts
```

If the Charon server name is not known to the TCPIP database, edit the /etc/hosts file and add the server ip address and its name.

Ensure manual commands can be passed to the Tru64 system from the Charon server.

#### Example ('pluto' is the Tru64 hostname):

```
# rsh pluto date
```

If a "poll: protocol failure in circuit setup" is returned, the firewall settings have to be set to open ports 113 and 1022.

Please always refer to your network administrator when changing the firewall rules, commands below are given as example only.

### Example for Red Hat Enterprise Linux 6.x servers:

```
# iptables -I INPUT -p tcp --dport 113 --syn -j ACCEPT
# iptables -I INPUT -p tcp --dport 1022 --syn -j ACCEPT
# service iptables save
```

#### Example for Red Hat Enterprise Linux 7.x and CentOS 7.x servers:

```
# firewall-cmd --permanent --new-service=Charon
# firewall-cmd --permanent --service=Charon --add-port=113/tcp
# firewall-cmd --permanent --service=Charon --add-port=1022/tcp
# firewall-cmd --get-active-zones
public
interfaces: ens34 ens35
# firewall-cmd --zone=public --permanent --add-service=Charon
# firewall-cmd --reload
```

# How to setup 'rsh' trusts between Linux and OpenVMS

### Introduction

RSH executes commands on a remote host. It can be used to issue a shutdown on the Charon OpenVMS virtual machine.

#### Pre-requisites

The RSH method requires the 'rsh' package. It can be installed using the following command:

```
# yum install rsh
```

#### Notes

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RSH and REXEC services must be available on the OpenVMS virtual machine. This depends on the OpenVMS version and a valid UCX license is required.

To enable these services, run @SYS\$MANAGER:TCPIP\$CONFIG, select the "Client components" and then enable and start "REXEC and RSH" services

Create a proxy between the root user of the Charon server and the user on the OpenVMS system issuing the shutdown.

#### Example ('ceres' is the Charon server name):

```
$ tcpip add proxy system /remote="root" /host=ceres
```

If the Charon server name is not known to the TCPIP database, use the following command to add it.

#### Example:

```
$ tcpip set host ceres /address=1.2.3.4
```

Copy charon\_shutdown.com script located in the /opt/charon/utils folder to SYS\$MANAGER:CHARON\_SHUTDOWN.COM on the OpenVMS system (using copy/paste for example). This is required as if the shutdown is executed directly from the 'rsh' command directly, 'rsh' will not timeout when the shutdown will be completed and the virtual machine will not be stopped cleanly, it will timeout depending on the service settings.

Ensure manual commands can be passed to the OpenVMS system from the Charon server.

#### Example ('vms084' is the OpenVMS hostname):

```
# rsh -1 system vms084 "show time"
```

If a "poll: protocol failure in circuit setup" is returned, the firewall settings have to be set to open ports 113 and 1022.

Please always refer to your network administrator when changing the firewall rules, commands below are given as example only.

#### Example for Red Hat Enterprise Linux 6.x servers:

```
# iptables -I INPUT -p tcp --dport 113 --syn -j ACCEPT
# iptables -I INPUT -p tcp --dport 1022 --syn -j ACCEPT
# service iptables save
```

#### Example for Red Hat Enterprise Linux 7.x and CentOS 7.x servers:

```
# firewall-cmd --permanent --new-service=Charon
# firewall-cmd --permanent --service=Charon --add-port=113/tcp
# firewall-cmd --permanent --service=Charon --add-port=1022/tcp
# firewall-cmd --get-active-zones
public
interfaces: ens34 ens35
# firewall-cmd --zone=public --permanent --add-service=Charon
# firewall-cmd --reload
```

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# Shutdown guests with Expect tool

#### Introduction

In case SSH cannot be used to perform clean shutdown of the guests, the "expect" tool can be used to connect to the console, perform the login operation and execute the shutdown command depending on the console status (at login prompt, shell prompt or SRM prompt)

In this case the password is sent without encryption.

To facilitate use of "expect" for shutdown, an example is provided in the "guest\_shutdown.exp" script located in the /opt/charon/utils folder. If you plan to customize the script, you'll have to create a copy and not use it directly as it will be overwritten in case of Toolkit upgrade.

'telnet' and 'expect' packages must be installed in order to use this feature.

The following error message can be returned when stopping the virtual machine when trying to use the expect script example:

- if expect package is not installed: "Stop script returned error code 126".
- if telnet is not installed: "%EXPECT-F-NOSRM, Cannot continue, 'telnet' is not installed" then "Stop script returned error code 4"

Caution: the virtual machine process will be however killed by service management process

#### Console locked:

Any active session to the console must be killed before the "expect" script is executed.

for example, if you are connected via "telnet" on the localhost/port (the kill is not done inside the expect script). Using the "/opt/char on/utils/charon\_gstart\_expect" script file the necessary operations will be performed.

🔼 If the console is locked from another host (if you use putty for example), you will have to cancel the connection by yourself otherwise the shutdown will not be performed cleanly.

This script can handle the following situations:

- No user connected on the console:
  - Expect: "Username: "(VMS) or "login: "(Tru64)
  - Action: An interactive session will be initiated based on <user> and <password> provided in the parameters
- A user is connected on the console:
  - Expect: crompt> provided in the parameters
  - 1 This user must have privileges to perform shutdown as no logout will be issued
  - Action: Depending on the Operating system parameter (see <opsys> below), the shutdown command will be sent
- Console is at SRM prompt:
  - Expect: '>>>' (so works with VAX and Alpha with "P00>>>")
  - Action: A 'power off' command will be issued. If the command is not recognized, the F6 key will be sent (this must be enabled within the configuration file). If the F6 key did not stop the emulator, the script will exit with error code 9 meaning you will have to kill the emulator process yourself. Using the "/opt/charon/utils/charon\_gstart\_expect" script file the necessary operations will be performed.



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# Quick Setup Guide

# Introduction

This article summarizes the operations to be performed to make your emulator running with the CHARON Linux Toolkit.

# Preparation

Create a folder to store the CHARON products and CHARON Linux Toolkit(s) Example:

```
# mkdir /charon
```

- Download the kits in this folder from the Stromasys sftp server using 'sftp' or your browser with the link provided by Stromasys.
- Optionally create a folder where to store your licenses (C2V and V2C files) Example:

```
# mkdir /charon/licenses
```

- Install the CHARON Linux Toolkit as described in the Setup page.
- Install the CHARON product(s) you need from menu option "Install/Upgrade/Remove Charon"
- Dedicate network interfaces to CHARON using menu option "Network Configuration Utility" (see your CHARON product documentation / networking chapter).
- Check the license can be read using the "HASP license details" menu option
- Prepare your configuration file(s) or use the clone utility available from the "VM management Update guests list" menu (see further).
- Prepare your storage configuration and create your vdisk files using the "mkdskcmd" command if needed. Example:

# mkdskcmd -o /data/vms0\_rz28.dsk -d rz28

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# Virtual machines creation

- Use the "VM management Update guests list" option from the "VM Management (add/remove VM, start, stop, console connection, ...)" menu option to add and start your new virtual machine (guest)
  - If you're running Red Hat Enterprise Linux 6, first install the service using the "Install or update service" option.
  - Optionally, use option "Enable/Disable start at server boot" to prevent the guest from starting automatically when the Linux server is booted
  - Optionally (but highly recommended), use option "Create/Edit guest stop script" to define the stop script that will be used to perform a
    clean shutdown of the virtual machine at service stop.
    - It is recommended to test your shutdown scripts before going on production
  - The log file monitoring service is created automatically.

# Post installation checks

- You can remove the USB dongle, if any, to verify the dongle removal is identified by the askusbd log monitor service:
  - If you enabled the 'wall' alerts from the "Alerts management" menu, you should receive an immediate 'wall' message.
  - If you disabled the 'wall' alerts from the "Alerts management" menu (default), you can have a look at the alerts history from the "Alerts management" menu
  - If the mail has been correctly configured, you will receive an alert with subject: "[CHARON] License dongle disconnected" quite immediately (please ensure the email has not been moved to the junk folder). The immediate alert can be followed by an alert coming from the virtual machine log monitoring announcing the time remaining before stop

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# Connection to guest console blocked by firewall

### **Problem**

Connections refused to guests console when connecting via telnet to localhost with the port number specified in the configuration file (10003, 10004, ...). This can be caused by firewall settings.

#### Example1:

```
# telnet charonserver 10003
telnet: connect to address 192.168.42.42: Connection refused
```

#### Example2:

```
# telnet charonserver 10003

Trying 192.168.42.42...
telnet: connect to address 192.168.42.42: No route to host
```

### Solution

To ensure the TCP ports are not blocked by the firewall, please execute the following commands

# Red Enterprise Linux Server 6.x

```
# iptables -I INPUT -p tcp --dport <port> --syn -j ACCEPT
# iptables -I INPUT -p udp --dport <port> -j ACCEPT
# service iptables save
```

#### Example:

```
# iptables -I INPUT -p tcp --dport 10003 --syn -j ACCEPT
# iptables -I INPUT -p udp --dport 10003 -j ACCEPT
# iptables -I INPUT -p tcp --dport 10004 --syn -j ACCEPT
# iptables -I INPUT -p udp --dport 10004 -j ACCEPT
# service iptables save
```

### Red Enterprise Linux Server 7.x and CentOS7 (using firewalld service)

As "firewalld" is installed by default, the commands used are those given in the example below.

### Example with console on port 10003:



## Solution 1 - using xterm settings


Before opening the terminal session, load the saved session you want to use and update the following parameters:

Terminal-type string can be set to either xterm or vt200 for Linux or VMS and can only be defined to vt200 for Tru64

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The "Remote character set" must be something else than the default UTF-8 depending on your location. Example: ISO-8859-1:1998 (Latin-1, West Europe)



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It is possible some characters will not be displayed correctly using this method. Example:

```
[root@ceres ~] # rm nothing
rm: cannot remove (anothinga). No such file or directory
```

The default font does not display boxes correctly. If you want to have a better look, please change the font in the "Window → Appearance" option and select either Consolas, Lucida Console or Terminal fonts rather than Courier New.

## Solution 2 - using putty and Linux locale settings

#### On the Linux host:

Add these lines in your .bashrc file (if you're using bash):

```
test "$TERM" = "putty" && export LC_ALL=C || export LC_ALL=en_US.utf8
export TERM=xterm
```

#### In putty:

- Window → Translation → Remote Character set: the default ISO-8859-1
- Connection  $\rightarrow$  Data  $\rightarrow$  Terminal-type string "putty"
- This solution solves the problem mentioned above

In case of unrequested Charon virtual machine stop, it is possible, using the systemd features, to restart Charon emulator automatically

# Step-by-step guide

#### **Additional considerations**

- To perform this procedure, you must have the necessary privileges to handle systemd service and execute systemct1 commands
- This documentation applies only to Linux distributions including the systemd feature. 
   • This does not apply to Red Hat Enterprise Linux 6
- 1. Setup your CHARON virtual machine as a service. To do so, refer to the corresponding documentation or install and use the CHARON Linux Toolkit.
- 2. Edit the service configuration file and add the following parameters:

Parameter	Туре	Description
Restart	text	Configures whether the service shall be restarted when the service process exits, is killed, or a timeout is reached
RestartSec	numeric	Configures the time to sleep before restarting a service (as configured with Restart=). Takes a unit-less value in seconds, or a time span value such as "5min 20s". Defaults to 100ms.
StartLimitInterval	numeric	seconds are not permitted to start any more times until the 10 second interval ends. With these two

 ExecStop=/charon/scripts/mystopscript /my_services/as4100-service.cfg
 Restart=on-failure
 RestartSec=30
 StartLimitInterval=600
 StartLimitBurst=2
 [Install]
 WantedBy=multi-user.target
```

3. Reload systemd manager configuration:

# systemctl daemon-reload

### **Notes**

### **Autoboot**

Restarting Charon emulator does not mean booting the OpenVMS or Tru64 virtual system. You will need to setup the flags at SRM level for autoboot.

### Charon-AXP

The default boot device and the action to be performed on boot have to be set

#### **Example for Charon-AXP:**

```
P00>>> set bootdef_dev dka0
P00>>> set auto_action restart
```

### Charon-VAX

CHARON-VAX can be configured to automatically boot an operating system at start up.

The MicroVAX 3100, VAX 6310 and VAX 4000 models boot automatically if the correct boot flags are set at the VAX console level:

```
>>>set halt reboot
```

Please check that the TOY, EEPROM and ROM containers (see above) are enabled so the console changes are saved upon reboots.

© Stromasys 2019 123 / 126 The ROM of certain VAX models (MicroVAX 3600, MicroVAX 3900, VAXserver 3600 and VAXserver 3900) does not allow the SRM console to accept the above command to enable auto booting. As a workaround, a specific setting can be defined in the configuration file:

set bdr boot=auto

The Charon-VAX 6000 models have a similar configuration setting:

set xmi boot=auto

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#### Restart limit reached

In case the StartLimitBurst is reached during the interval, you will not be able to restart the service until you reset the failure counter.


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### Charon Linux Toolkit integration

The CHARON Linux Toolkit, starting version 41, is able to manage the auto-restart settings.

1 Starting with kit version 42, if auto-restart settings are defined they will be displayed in the virtual machines lists while navigating in the menu options and the failure counter will be reset on each start (from the menu)
